THE JEWISH COMMUNITY LIBRARY

The Jewish Community of Mount Carmel, which a month ago was still a project, has now become a reality. Thanks to the cooperation of the Tifereth Israel Congregation, the Jewish Fellowship Club, the B'nai B'rith and Hadassah, the Library has acquired sufficient funds to build up a basic stock of books during the first year. Of course, this is only a beginning though an auspicious one, and we hope to expand it, in the years to come, to be the pride of the Mount Carmel Jewish Community and an outstanding example of a progressive community spirit. Through the courtesy of the Jewish Publication Society of America and Mr. Maurice Jacobs, its Executive Vice-President, the Library was able to make a special arrangement for the purchase of books which will result in a saving of 25 percent to 40 percent on the price. The L'brary also holds a membership in the Jewish Book Guild and Jewish Pocket Books, both of which supply important and worthwhile books at great

Here are some of the books that are on the shelf now:

ZIONISM by Richard J. H. Gottheil. This is a history of the Zionist movement from its inception through the first stormy years until 1912. It was written by a contemporary of Theodore Herzl and Max Nordau, and is of special interest and importance to Zionists and Hadassah members.

THEODORE HERZL, by Alex Bein. The best biography of the romantic, adventurous, self-sacrificing founder of the Zion'st movement, masterfully translated by Maurice Samuel.

LI ELINE TO A PROMISED LAND, by Ira A. Hirschmann Mr. Hirschmann

went to the Balkans during the war as special representative of President Roosevelt, to arrange for the release of Hitler's victims, and presents here an account of his activities and adventures. The book was recently dramatized on the radio.

JEWISH CONTRIBUTIONS TO CIVILIZATION, by Joseph Jacobs. This is an appraisal of the role played by the Jews in the progress of mankind.

CONFESSION, By Nathan Birnbaum. Nathan Birnbaum was one of the most remarkable personalities of modern times. He was instrumental in the growth of modern Jewish movements, from Zionism to Agudath Israel, and traveled the long road from Agnosticism to strictest Orthodoxy. In this book he describes his gradual "conversion" to positive Judaism.

THE KUZARI, by Judah Halevi. The classic of Judaism.

On the lighter side, there is THE OLD COUNTRY, by Sholom Aleichem, which contains some of his most beloved tales, and several other collections of Yiddish classics in English translation, such as I. L. Perez, Berditchevsky, Levin, and and other stories by H. N. Bialik, and an anthology of Jewish humor by S. F. Mendelsohn.

All books are available free for home reading, and can be obtained through Rabbi Oles or Mrs. Oles at the Club Rooms. Library rules are posted there, as well as a bulletin on new acquisitions.

FROM YOUR RABBI

One of the most popular holidays of the Jewish year is Chamisho Ossor Bishvat, the New Year of the trees. It is a peculiar holiday for it is hallowed by no special prayers, celebrated by no religious service, and yet it has for us the deepest religious significance. It is the day on which we celebrate the re-awakening of nature from its winter slumber, the day that proves again the neverfailing workings of the Divine providence. Nature, under the wise guidance of the Almighty, comes to life again to give us of its bounty, and we mark the day of its rebirth by pronouncing the blessings over nature's fruits.

Our brethren in the Holy Land dedicate Chamisho Ossor Bishvat to the rebuilding of their own soil. On Chamisho Ossor trees are planted all over Palestine with ceremonies of joy and hope, joy over the achievements of the past, and hope for final redemption, through work and prayer, in the future. Our thought's and hopes are with them on this day, and we are ready, as always, to lend them a hand in the fulfillment of their aspirations. Yet, we may ask ourselves at this point whether we are really as helpful to the cause of the Jewish people as we should or could be. On the material side the answer is yes, but we must remember that this alone cannot keep the Jewish people alive.

"Not on bread alone does man live, but on all that proceeds from the mouth of the Lord does man live." These words from the parting address of our great leader and teacher Moses contain the secret of Israel's life. In order to insure our existence as G—d's people, in order to win the battle for justice for our people, we must do justice to our own purpose. And our purpose is, first and foremost, the service of G—d and the realization of His ideals. These ideals are contained in the word of G—d as it is heard in the synagogue, and as it is presented in the various Community projects.

On this day of Chamisho Ossor we must resolve that with the rebirth of nature there shall be a rebirth of our Jewish ideals, so that Israel can once more look forward to a bright future.
