FROM YOUR RABBI

Purim is traditionally a time of Jewish rejoicing. The cause for it is clearly stated in the Megillah, the Book of Esther, that is read at the Synagogue services: "For the Jews there was light and joy and gladness and honor."

What they will be like this year, when the Yishuv is engaged in its grim fight for survival, cannot be foretold here. But whatever it will be, Purim, to the Jews of Palestine as well as to Jews everywhere, is a symbol of an ancient victory and of everlasting hope.

In this regard Purim is typical of all Jewish holidays, of all Jewish religious practices. They have their roots in the past, sometimes happy and sometimes sad, and they guide the way to a hopeful future that will make the difficult present worthwhile. Judaism is positive in its outlook and it asks for positive adherence. Jewish observances, at home or at the Synagogue, are valid today, not because they are old, but because they are as meaningful today as they ever were. Their value can be appreciated, not by a mind conditioned by our Christian environment, but by a heart that carries in it Jewish experience of thousands of years.

Let me be more specific. When we persist in saying our public and private prayers in Hebrew, we do so in recognition of the fact that Hebrew is the tongue in which the historic development of Judaism found its expression. We do so because the Hebrew prayer alone establishes the bond between the scattered parts of the Jewish people. As for those of us who are not fortunate enough to understand fully the meaning of the Hebrew text, let them rest assured that the value of their prayers remains undiminished.

Judaism has always held that the individual can come much closer to the fulfillment of his spiritual needs through the community of prayer. Hence we have the Minyan, the quorum of ten required for a service. Hence we have the fact that it is the common and like prayer that counts more than the understanding of every word. And hence we have, once more, the reason for prayers in Hebrew.

To come back to Purim, merriment on that day is a religious duty, whether it be in the Syna-

gogue or wherever Jews gather. We have learned how to make merry on New Years Eve. Let us apply the lesson to Purim and try to make it a real communal holiday. It is fun to be in Shul and to klopp Haman, and it is inspiring at the same time. And the inspiration of Purim may grow into a fuller, more satisfying Jewish life.
